



## Supreme Court Corrupted

CBTU National President Statement on the appointment of Brett Kavanaugh to the Supreme Court

Statement by Rev. Terry Melvin

President, Coalition of Black Trade Unionists

Brett Kavanaugh has been appointed to the highest court of our country. Brett Kavanaugh is now a Supreme Court Justice. He has earned this role not through merits, credentials, or professionalism. Rather he has been appointed due to partisanship, political motivations, and misogyny. He has been given this position exclusively due to his privilege and the manner in which he can be manipulated. Our Supreme Court, once considered to be objective and the last bastion of justice, is now completely tainted and corrupted by this appointment. CBTU is ashamed and appalled at all legislators that voted in support of Brett Kavanaugh. CBTU stands in opposition of his appointment.

The role of a Supreme Court Justice is to view and interpret the law above one's political ideology. As the final say in all judicial matters the Supreme Court needs to maintain an objectivity beyond political party, and make rulings with sound legal precedent. We have found that this Court is currently very partisan and Brett Kavanaugh has proven he will vote with a political agenda. Before cameras and Senators he attacked Democrats, complained of a conspiracy theory, yelled and cried, and repeatedly stated he liked beer. His temperament and behavior make him unfit for the bench, but most importantly it validated that he will be biased and vindictive on the bench. With enough votes from his party Brett was able to use his frat boy persona to become a Supreme Court Judge.

We have failed as a nation and most importantly we have failed our women of this country. We have allowed sexual assault to be treated as a punch line, and have validated white male privilege with this appointment. But most crucially, we have proven that political apathy, low voter turnout, and disinterest in our government will lead to consequences that will be felt by generations. We have failed our children with the appointment of Brett Kavanaugh because we have allowed his enablers to take over seats of power. CBTU opposes this Supreme Court appointment and is committed to making sure we put the right people into power and organizing beyond the rulings of this court. Janis v. AFSCME didn't stop us and neither will Brett.



> CBTU - Rochester joins 1199SEIU Anthony Jordan Workers on Picket Line at Jordan's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary Gala. The union committee has accepted the Federal Mediator's settlement proposal even though it calls for a 2018 wage freeze. It also includes the substantial savings from reducing the cost of health insurance to the Center.

> Because health insurance is paid for as a percentage of payroll, the 2018 wage freeze creates a shortfall in health plan funding. The Federal Mediator added a 1% wage increase in July, 2020 that makes up that shortfall. That 1% is at the heart of the disagreement. The union has offered several alternatives to the 1% wage increase. The Center has rejected them all.
